Strategies to Select Primary Dressings:

Foams, gauze/composite dressings

Wound cleansing

Dry/minimally draining wounds

Hydrogel

Oil emulsions

Hydrocolloids, non-adherent foams Less frequent dressing changes

Moderate/Heavy/Copious exudate

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
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
